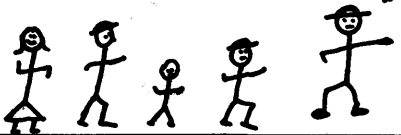

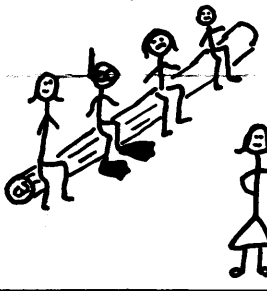
WHAT DO WE DO AT JUNGLE CAMP???

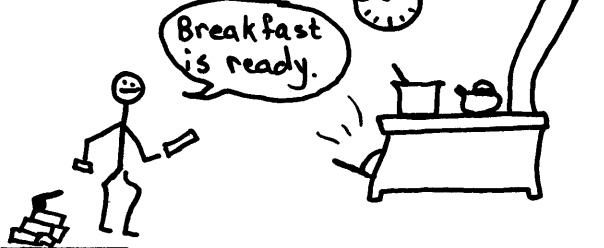
